

"There was a master of a house who planted a vineyard..." (Matt 21:33)

Seven hundred years before Jesus began to preach, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand," the prophet Isaiah was inspired by God to deliver a parable-like song of his own. Let's turn back to Isaiah 5:1-7 and carefully read the prophet's "love song." In simplest terms, what is God communicating in this passage?

Centuries later, Jesus had made his "triumphal entry" into Jerusalem (Matt 21:1-11), cleansed the temple (21:12-17), and had his authority challenged by the chief priests and elders of the people (21:23-27). In Matthew 21:28, he asked a simple question: "What do you think?" and launched into a series of parables. For the moment, let's focus in on the first two:

- The parable of the two sons (21:28-32)
- The parable of the tenants (21:33-46)

In your own words, **what is Jesus now communicating?** Do you see a connection to Isaiah 5?

What good signs of growth and fruit-the sort of fruit God has been looking for all along-can be seen, even in Matthew 21?

What did Jesus mean by the warning in 21:43-46?

How had the chief priests and elders of the people slipped so hard and far? We'll dive deeper into some of the accompanying parables soon, but for the moment, consider:

- "If this man were a prophet, he would have known what sort of woman this is..." (Luke 7:36-40)
- "This man receives sinners and eats with them..." (Luke 15:1-3)

How do these glimpses from the gospels connect us to the deep, ancient roots of the LORD's vineyard?
