# EVERYTHING

**“The aim of our charge is...”** From the beginning of his first letter to Timothy, Paul wants the young evangelist to see this point clearly. The reminder was necessary because:

- Some were teaching different \_\_\_\_\_ (1:3; 6:2b-3)
- Some were devoting themselves to \_\_\_\_\_ and endless genealogies (1:4; 4:7a)
- Some were promoting \_\_\_\_\_ rather than faithful stewardship (1:4; 4:6)
- Some had swerved and wandered away into \_\_\_\_\_ discussion (1:6; 4:1)
- Some were confidently talking about things they didn't \_\_\_\_\_ (1:7; 6:4-7)
- Some had made \_\_\_\_\_ of their faith (1:19-20; 4:7b-8)

In contrast, Timothy was being called on to \_\_\_\_\_ differently (3:14-15), \_\_\_\_\_ these things (4:11) and set a better \_\_\_\_\_ (4:12) that would be fueled by:

**A sincere** \_\_\_\_\_  
(1:8-11)

**A good** \_\_\_\_\_  
(1:12-17)

**A pure** \_\_\_\_\_  
(6:10-11)

And what will **“issue”** from these things? **“The aim of our charge is \_\_\_\_\_”** (1:5).
