

DANIEL FOUR

There are several special things about this chapter

- The entire chapter is about Nebuchadnezzar
- It was a proclamation that was to be read and shared throughout the kingdom
- It reveals yet another divine dream of the king

A. The chapter begins and ends with praise to God (2, 37)

- there is reason to believe that the king "converted" and became a believer

1. In this dream, the king tells the wise men what he saw. There is no death threat failing to interpret it (as in chapter 2).

- the wise men could not interpret it
- Daniel, once again is called and does
- 2. It is believed that this takes place near the end of Nebuchadnezzar's life.
 - He had time to build Babylon into a mighty empire and city.
 - One of the seven wonders of the world were the gardens of Babylon
 - Several times Nebuchadnezzar refers to God as "Most High" (2, 17, 24,25, 32,34)

The Dream:

- A mighty tree that is full of health and fruit reaches to the Heavens
- An angel announces that the tree will be cut down, but the roots preserved
- A mind will be lost and one will live like a beast of the field for a period of time

The Meaning:

- Daniel seems bothered by this dream (He may have grown to like Nebuchadnezzar) He takes no pleasure in this.
- The tree is Nebuchadnezzar. He will lose his mind and then once a lesson has been learned he will be restored
- Daniel this time adds a personal word of advice to help the king (27)

B. A year passes (29)

- 1. The King boasts about what He feels are His accomplishments
- 2. "A voice from Heaven" removes his sovereignty by making him mentally ill



- the king ate grass, his hair grew, his nails became like claws
- Nebuchadnezzar's pride is repeated in 5:20 (Isa 14:13-14,22)
 - Beasts are governed by instinct
 - Beasts do not reason
 - Beasts do not think about consequences

C. The King learned his lesson

- 1. He praises God (34)
- 2. Acknowledges the enduring nature of God's kingdom (34)
- 3. God doesn't give up on King Nebuchadnezzar God is more patient with him that Pharaoh, Herod (Acts 12:21-23), or Caesar

Seven Periods of Time (16, 23, 25, 32)

- Not so much years, months, seasons, weeks—but when God has completed His purpose (4:17)
- Seven is the complete number in the Bible

God dislikes Pride

- Prov 6:16-17 one of the things God hates
- Prov 16:18

Part of Nebuchadnezzar's humility is sharing this story throughout the providence. It makes him look bad. It shows his mistakes.
