

DANIEL NINE

This chapter of Daniel involves one central thought. It is Daniel's prayer and God's answer to that prayer. In God's answer, future events and a timeline is revealed. The 70 weeks, of the final verses, involve the coming of Christ and the redemptive work He would do.

Textual Background

- Once again, Gabriel, the angel appears to Daniel
- The chapter takes place in the first year of Darius (5:31)
- Daniel refers to the writings of Jeremiah (9:2), the prophets (6) and the Law of Moses (13)
- The "Messiah" (25) is the 'anointed one' or in the N.T. "Christ"
 - 1. Daniel gave attention to seek the Lord (3)

Through: prayer, supplication, fasting, sackcloth and ashes: illustrating a humble heart

- 2. In the writings of Jeremiah—Daniel gave thought to the 70 years of captivity (2)
 - Jer 25:11-12
 - The 70 years were completed. Daniel was wondering when the people of God would be restored to Jerusalem. He has already seen the beginning fulfillment of the dreams in ch 2 & 4
 - Daniel considered Jeremiah's writing as "word of the Lord" (2 Pet 3:15-16 Paul's writings were considered "Scripture")

Daniel's Prayer (4-19)

1. Daniel's honor of God

- God is great and awesome (4)
- God is righteous (7)
- God keeps His covenant (4)



Contrast to Judah who broke God's covenant

- the expression, "O Lord" is used 7x

2. Daniel's confession of sin

- He uses the word "we" (11x) and himself personally (20)
- Daniel uses five expressions to describe the fallen state of Judah (5)

Not listened to God's prophets (6)

Shame belongs to us (7)

Not obeyed the voice of God (10)

They are deserving of this "curse" (11) and "calamity" (13) - Deut 28:15-20

3. Daniel's Petition for God's Honor and Glory

- The deliverance from Egypt brought honor to God (15)
- Daniel pleads for God to again deliver His people back to Jerusalem for His honor (16) Emphasis is upon God: Thy city (16) They holy mountain (16) Thy people (16) Thy sanctuary (17)
- Daniel asks God to turn His wrath (16) and forgive (19)

God's Immediate Answer (20-27)

- 1. While Daniel was still praying, Gabriel appeared (20-21)
 - He reveals that Daniel is 'greatly loved' by God (23)

A. The 70 Weeks Decreed (24)

- <u>The 70 weeks are broken down as:</u> 7 weeks—62 weeks
 - 1 week (midweek)
- Finish the transgression
- Make an end to sin
- Make atonement for iniquity
- Bring everlasting righteousness
- Seal up the vision



- many view each day as one year

Believe this is describing a period of 490 years (from the return of Judah to the time of Christ) To make this work different starting points are assumed

- Cyrus' decree in 536 B.C. to allow Jews to return to Jerusalem seems to be the starting point 2 Chron 36:22-23
- <u>or, these "weeks" may be representative of a period of time</u>—God's time

 7 seems to be Heaven's number, especially as used in creation and book of Revelation


The 70 weeks begins with orders to rebuild Jerusalem (25) and ends with confirmation of a new covenant (27)

- "wing of abominations" (27) refers to the destruction of Jerusalem by Titus in A.D. 70

Matthew 24:15-20; Luke 21:20-24 (quotes this passage)

Jewish Historian Josephus wrote:

Daniel also wrote concerning the Roman government and that our country should be made desolate by them.
