

1 Timothy 1:18-2:7

This command I entrust to you, Timothy, *my* son, in accordance with the prophecies previously made concerning you, that by them you fight the good fight, ¹⁹ keeping faith and a good conscience, which some have rejected and suffered shipwreck in regard to their faith. ²⁰ Among these are Hymenaeus and Alexander, whom I have handed over to Satan, so that they will be taught not to blaspheme.

2 First of all, then, I urge that requests, prayers, intercession, and thanksgiving be made in behalf of all people, ² for kings and all who are in authority, so that we may lead a tranquil and quiet life in all godliness and dignity.³ This is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior, ⁴ who wants all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. ⁵ For there is one God, and one mediator also between God and mankind, *the* man Christ Jesus, ⁶ who gave Himself as a ransom for all, the testimony given at the proper time. ⁷ For this I was appointed as a preacher and an apostle (I am telling the truth, I am not lying), as a teacher of the Gentiles in faith and truth.

First things First

Paul returns to his initial reason for writing Timothy, to warn him about false teachers and to encourage him to remain faithful to God's word. This is a battle or a "fight."

Remain True (1:18-20)

- This command (18) is what Paul "urged" at the beginning (1:3)
- The "prophecies" (4:14) may have been in connection to Paul including Timothy in his travels

<u>Keep Faith and a Good Conscience (19)</u> Protect the Truth and guard your personal faith

- ► Hymenaeus: likely the same in 2 Tim 2:17-18
- Alexander: common name (2 Tim 4:14-15)
