By the time Paul wrote his letter to the Ephesians, Jesus *had* built his church:

And [God] put all things under [Jesus'] feet and gave him as head over all things to the church, which _____ his _____, the fullness of him who fills all in all. (Eph 1:22-23)

But what is the church?

The New Testament wasn't written in English; it was written in the Greek language and the Greek word we have translated "church" in our Bibles is *ekklesia*. It means "________." It doesn't even have to have a religious meaning—it's just an assembly (Acts 19:32) or congregation (Acts 15:30) of people.
