

1 Timothy 3:1-7

It is a trustworthy statement: if any man aspires to the office of overseer, it is a fine work he desires to do.<sup>2</sup> An overseer, then, must be above reproach, the husband of one wife, temperate, self -controlled, respectable, hospitable, skillful in teaching,<sup>3</sup> not overindulging in wine, not a bully, but gentle, not contentious, free from the love of money.<sup>4</sup> He must be one who manages his own household well, keeping his children under control with all dignity<sup>5</sup> (but if a man does not know how to manage his own household, how will he take care of the church of God?), <sup>6</sup> and not a new convert, so that he will not become conceited and fall into condemnation incurred by the devil.<sup>7</sup> And he must have a good reputation with those outside *the church*, so that he will not fall into disgrace and the snare of the devil. In the text of 1 Timothy, Paul now turns to the roles of Bishops & Deacons within the congregation. Appointing elders was part of "setting things in order" (Titus 1:5). The work of elders is often misunderstood and misused. It is important for all of us to know the organizational structure of a congregation (Phil 1:1). Much too often, we focus upon only one or two of the qualities, and worse, we incorporate our own ideas into this list.

- A. This section in Timothy defines who can serve as an overseer:
  - 1. The nature of the work is not illustrated here
  - 2. Something immediately to notice:
    - Overseer (1) is \_\_\_\_\_: each person needs to meet these standards ("An overseer must be")
      Paul uses "must" 3x in this section (2, 4, 7)

## Seven Things You Need To Know about Elders:

- 1. The terms elder, shepherd, overseer, bishop, pastor all refer to the \_\_\_\_\_\_ leadership role (Acts 20:28; 1 Pet 5:1-3; Eph 4:11)
  - there is no distinction between a bishop and elder
- 2. The extent of their work is the \_\_\_\_\_ congregation where they are (1 Pet 5:2)
- 3. The office involves a \_\_\_\_\_\_ of men (Phil 1:1; Acts 14:23; 20:17) - the idea of a chief elder, head elder is foreign to

## The expression "elder" does not so much indicate age as it does experience. The elder has been around a long time:

- 1. He has been around Jesus a long time: He understands the \_\_\_\_\_
