

What is grace? We've been learning that grace is undeserved blessing. Okay, but what does that *mean*? What's it look like? On Wednesdays this month, we've looked at **faces of grace**–examples of people in the Bible who gave and received grace. This week, Jesus' parable of **The Two Debtors**.

Can you find **Matthew 18** in your Bible? One day, Jesus told a story about two servants in debt.

A **debtor** is someone who **owes** something and is expected to **pay it back**.

"Therefore the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his servants. When he began to settle, one was brought to him who owed him ten thousand talents." (Matt 18:23-24)

What?!? Do you know much ten thousand talents is?

1 talent = ____ years worth of work ...which means if a servant owed the king 10,000 talents, he would have to work...

> _____ **years** to pay off his debt! _____ **days** worth of work!

Is there any way that servant could ever pay back his debt? **No way!** But the king, "forgives" the debt. **Amazing!** And what does the forgiven servant do next?

Well that's what makes Jesus' parable so interesting...

- How is this parable a great example of the way God teaches us to treat each other in Ephesians 4:32?
