## For Class & Family Discussion:

- Let's turn our Bibles back to Luke 5 and think a little more about what we're seeing:
  - Was it a good thing for Peter to say, "I am a sinful man, O Lord" (5:8)?
  - Was it a good thing for him to say, "Depart from me"?
  - How do people continue to say "Depart from me" to Jesus?
  - "From now on..." (5:10)
    Think about those powerful words from Jesus. What can we learn from them?
- That leads us back to Paul's words in 1 Corinthians 6...
  - Why was the "Do not be deceived" warning (6:9) necessary?
  - Take a look at what the Spirit describes as works of "unrighteousness" in 6:9-10. Why would these keep me from "inheriting the kingdom of God"?
  - What makes 6:11 such good news? In your own words, what does it mean to be "sanctified"?
