

The apostle Paul unmistakably connects the deadly dots of idolatry for us on two different occasions.

- To the saints in Colossae, "Put to death therefore what is earthly in you: sexual immorality, impurity, passion, evil desire, and \_\_\_\_\_\_

which is \_\_\_\_\_. On account of these the wrath of God is coming" (Col 3:5-6).

"Covetousness" sounds really serious, but what is it?

Covetousness is wanting some \_\_\_\_\_. more than I want \_\_\_\_\_.

Do you remember the first of the 10 Commandments? "You shall have no other \_\_\_\_\_ before me." (Exo 20:3)

But notice also the last of those 10 Commandments: "You shall not \_\_\_\_\_\_your neighbor's house ... your neighbor's wife, or his male servant, or his female servant, or his ox, or his donkey, or anything that is your neighbor's." (Exo 20:17)

Why did God warn us about these deadly traps so long ago? Because when I want some thing more than I want God, sometimes I'll go to great (and hurtful) lengths to get it (Exo 20:13-16).

This is exactly why Jesus told us the straightforward truth in Matthew 6:24: "No one can serve two masters ... you cannot serve \_\_\_\_\_ and \_\_\_\_\_."
