While there were serious consequences described to Eve (3:16) and to

Adam (3:17-19), in his words to the serpent, God revealed a **HUGE** promise that will help us in our **search for the King**.

"I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your

offspring and her offspring; he shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise his heel." (Gen 3:15)

Our King is the SERPENT-CRUSHER. Let's talk about what that means...

Can you find **John 8:44** in your Bible? Let's listen to how Jesus describes the devil. What does our King want us to understand about that sneaky serpent?



The sneaky serpent is a liar, but look at what the Gospel of John teaches us about Jesus, our King:

- And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth. (John 1:14)
- So Jesus said to the Jews who had believed him, "If you abide in my word, you are truly my disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." (John 8:31-32)

How is our King different and better than the devil?

Genesis 3 shows us how Adam and Eve regretted their choice and tried to hide what they had done from God, but they needed God's help. Since they had sinned, God had to send them away from the garden and from his presence (God can't be around evil things because God is pure and good). But, God wasn't giving up on humans. He already had a plan to make us good and holy so that we could live

that plan?
