The Serpent-Crusher

On Sundays in 2022 we're on a journey through the Old Testament, **Searching For The King**. Last Sunday we focused on the creative work of the Word of God in Genesis 1-2. Our King was *there*, in the beginning! But Genesis 3 introduces us to the "ancient serpent," our greatest enemy.



"Did God actually say..." (3:1)

→ He twisted God's words.

"Did God actually say, 'You shall not eat of any tree in the garden'?" (3:1)

→ He <u>lied</u> about the consequences of disobeying God.

"You will not surely die." (3:4)

 He encouraged Eve to doubt God's goodness.

"For God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God..." (3:5)

Eve believed the serpent's lies, Adam went right along with her and "sin came into the world" (Rom 5:12).

Just like Adam and Eve (Gen 3:6), when I sin, I...

- Take what isn't mine
- Do what I want to do
- Do what is good in my <u>own</u> eyes

While there were serious consequences described to Eve (3:16) and to Adam (3:17-19), in his words to the serpent, God revealed a **massive** promise relevant to our search for the King.

"I will put **enmity** between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her offspring; he shall bruise your **head**, and you shall bruise his heel."

(Gen 3:15)



For Class & Family Discussion:

- Let's open our Bibles to John 8:44 and listen to how Jesus describes the devil. What does our King want us to understand?
- Let's think through those four points in Genesis 3. Why is it a very dangerous thing to:
 - Challenge God's will?
 - Twist God's words?
 - Lie about the consequences of disobeying God?
 - Encourage anyone to doubt God's goodness?
- How does Galatians 4:4-5 relate to God's promise in Genesis 3:15?
- Let's listen to John 1:14 and 8:31-32. Satan is the deceiver; what about our King? How is he different?
- How did the serpent "bruise" the "heel" of Jesus?
- Finally, let's think through another promise in Romans 16:19-20. How does it relate to Genesis 3?
