## Isaac, the Son of Promise

Have you ever had to wait a *really* long time for a promise to be fulfilled?

In Genesis 12, we heard God make some incredible promises to a 75-year-old man named Abram who didn't have any children. Abram and Sarai waited... and waited... and waited... for **25 years**! Think about that...

Twenty-four years after Genesis 12, the LORD appeared to Abraham and made clear that he hadn't forgotten his promise:

The LORD said, "I will surely return to you about this time \_\_\_\_\_\_ year, and Sarah your wife shall have a \_\_\_\_\_." (Gen 18:10)

When Sarah heard those words, she laughed! Abraham was almost 100 years old now and Sarah was almost 90. But, listen to the LORD's question:

"Is anything too \_\_\_\_\_\_ for the LORD?" (18:14)

Genesis 21 records for us that God kept his promise to that old couple when **Isaac** (*he laughs*) was born.

About 2,000 years later, an angel was sent from God to a city of Galilee named Nazareth, to a virgin named Mary who was betrothed to a man named Joseph.

"Behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall call his name \_\_\_\_\_." (Luke 1:31)

When Mary struggled to understand (just like *anyone* would struggle to understand) and asked, "How will this be?" the angel emphasized the same truth Abraham learned 2,000 years before: "For nothing will be \_\_\_\_\_\_ with God" (Luke 1:37)



## For Class & Family Discussion:

- We can only speculate, but can you think of any reasons why God would wait 25 years before blessing Abraham and Sarah with a son?
- Let's notice how the writer of Hebrews highlights this event in Hebrews 11:11-12. What does he want us to understand?
- What sort of things are "too hard" for us, even in the 21st century? Why is it good for us to be reminded that there are plenty of things "too hard" for us to do?
- Mary wasn't the only person who grappled with "How can this be?" in the beginning of Luke's Gospel. Who else learned firsthand that nothing is impossible for God in Luke 1?
- Think about these promises of God in light of passages like 1 Thessalonians 5:23-24. What does it all have to do with us?
- Finally, what does 2 Peter
  3:8-9 help us see about the timing of God's promises?
