Teaching in Trouble
Jesus appears in the Gospels to swing across the pendulum of popularity in the minds of the multitudes. Jesus began as an unknown. He quickly rose to great heights in popularity.
Mt 4:25 "And great followed Him from Galilee and Decapolis and Jerusalem and Judea and from beyond the Jordan."
Lk 12:1 "Under these circumstances, after so many of the multitude had gathered together that they were stepping on one another."
Mk 12:37 "And the large crowd listening to Him."
 Lk 5:17 "And it came about one day that He was teaching; and there were some Pharisee and teachers of the law sitting there, who had come from of Galilee and Judea and from Jerusalem; and the power of the Lord was present for Him to perform healing."
• Mk 6:32-33 "And they went away in the boat to a lonely place by themselves. And the people saw them going, and many recognized them, and they there together on foot from the cities, and got there ahead of them."
 As the divine appointment with the Cross approached and the call to discipleship intensified, Jesus fell out of favor with many. The great crowds that once came to hear Him, were now shouting "Crucify Him, Crucify Him." And, aside from just a handful of followers, Jesus died alone.
As the tide of popularity turned against Him, verbal attacks arose. The Jewish leadership tried to do two things:
(1) Win back the with the people (Mt 27:18 "it was because of they had handed Him over")
 Jn 12:10-11 "But the chief priests took counsel that they might put Lazarus to death also; on account of him many of the Jews were going away an were believing in Jesus." Jn 11:53-54 "So from that day on they planned together to kill Him. Jesus therefore no longer continued to walk among the Jews." Jn 7:1 "And after these things Jesus was walking in Galilee; for He was to walk in Judea, because the Jews were seeking to kill Him." (2) Jesus in a theological corner that would expose Him as a false teacher and a blasphemer
