

Can you find the book of 2 Corinthians in your Bible? As we read 2 Corinthians 5:19-20, listen carefully to how Paul summarizes the mission of Jesus' apostles:

... in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and _______ to us the message of reconciliation. Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal ______ us. We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God.

Who WERE these apostles? There are lots of ways to answer that question, but here's one: the apostles were ambassadors for Jesus Christ. Well, what does that mean? Here are a few verses that can really help us understand:

...the gospel, for which I am an ambassador in chains, that I may ______ it boldly, as I ought to speak. (Ephesians 6:19-20)

...for he is the ______ of the LORD of hosts. (Malachi 2:7)

... you did not scorn or despise me, but received me as an angel of God, Christ Jesus. (Galatians 4:14)

An **ambassador** is someone who comes with a message; someone who ought to be received "as" the one who sent him or her.

- % Jesus himself had promised that his apostles would be guided in a unique way by the Holy Spirit (John 14:25-26; 16:12-14).
- * The apostles' responsibility as ambassadors was to declare the whole counsel of God (Matthew 28:19-20; Acts 20:27).
