

Psalm 69 describes a really tough time in David's life. Just listen to what he said in Psalm 69:4: "More in number than the hairs of my head are those who hate me without cause." From the very first verse of Psalm 69, David is praying: "Save me, O God."

But pay special attention to what he writes in Psalm 69:9:

For zeal for your house has consumed me...

What does this have to do with our search for our King? A thousand years after David wrote Psalm 69, Jesus from Nazareth came to Jerusalem. John 2 tells us:

The Passover of the Jews was at hand, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the \underline{temple} he found those

who were selling oxen and sheep and pigeons, and

the money-changers sitting there. And making a whip of cords,



he drove them all out of the temple, with the sheep and oxen. And he poured out the coins of the money-changers and overturned their tables. And he told those who sold the pigeons, "Take these things away; do not make my <u>Father's</u> house a house of trade." His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me." (John 2:13-17)

The book of Psalms was a song book for Israel. Generation after generation, the descendants of Abraham sang those psalms. And many, many times, the words in the book of Psalms find their greatest fulfillment

in Jesus, our King, including Psalm 69. How? Why? Remember what Jesus told us in Luke 24:44: "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the Law of Moses and the Prophets and **the Psalms** must be fulfilled."
