

Can you find the Gospel of MATTHEW in your Bible? We're going to read from Matthew 27 today before turning our Bibles over to Psalm 22. For a few weeks, we're looking at some of the psalms David wrote. What's the connection to Jesus? How do the psalms help us see our King and understand his will for our lives?

Matthew 27:45-50 is a sad description of what Jesus went through on the cross:

Now from the <u>sixth</u> hour \_\_\_\_\_\_ We would say \_\_\_\_\_:00 PM there was darkness over all the land until the **ninth hour**. ----> We would say \_\_\_\_\_:00 PM And about the ninth hour Jesus cried out with a loud voice, saying, "Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?" that is, "My God, my God, \_\_\_\_\_ have you forsaken me?" And some of the bystanders, hearing it, said, "This man is calling Elijah."



But Jesus WASN'T calling out for Elijah. He was quoting the first line of Psalm 22, a thousand-year-old psalm of David. But WHY? Notice some

of the things David wrote in Psalm 22 and how much it sounds like what Jesus was going through:



...they have \_\_\_\_\_ my hands and feet...

...they divide my \_\_\_\_\_\_ among them,

and for my clothing they cast lots. (22:16-18)

What's the connection? Of all the passages Jesus could quote from the cross, why Psalm 22? What does it help us believe about our King? Let's talk about it ...
