

"Behold my servant." There's lots of bad news in Isaiah's prophecy, but in Isaiah 42, God begins describing his "servant, whom I have chosen, in whom my soul delights" (Isaiah 42:1). Who would this servant be? Why would he be sent? What would he do? Let's focus in on Isaiah 52:13:

Behold, my servant shall act \_\_\_\_\_;
he shall be high and lifted up,
and shall be exalted.

But the very next verse describes this servant being beaten up and treated badly. Something bad is going to happen to this servant, but why?

Surely he has borne \_\_\_\_\_ griefs
and carried our sorrows;

yet we esteemed him stricken,
smitten by God, and afflicted.

But he was \_\_\_\_\_ for our transgressions;
he was crushed for our iniquities;
upon him was the chastisement that brought us peace,
and with his wounds we are \_\_\_\_\_.

All we like sheep have gone astray;
we have turned—every one—to his own way;
and the LORD has \_\_\_\_\_ on him

the iniquity of us all. (Isaiah 53:4-6)



This servant sent by God would die for the sins of other people, like a sacrificed lamb. But his death wouldn't be the end of the story. "He shall see his offspring; he shall prolong his days; the will of the LORD will prosper in his hand" (Isaiah 53:10). Yes, this servant would bear "the sins of many" and make "intercession for the transgressors" (Isaiah 53:12). But he would not stay in his grave.

Who is he? Seven hundred years later, Jesus of Nazareth fulfilled Isaiah's incredible prophecy!


