
## 2 • The Beginning of Sin

Let's listen very carefully to the serpent's words because what we're listening to is the beginning of sin—mankind's greatest problem.
He said to the woman, "Did God say, 'You shall not eat of tree in the garden'?" And the woman said to the serpent, "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden, but God said, 'You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the midst of the garden, neither shall you touch it, lest you die." But the serpent said to the woman, "You will surely die. For God that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." (3:1-5)
