## 1 • Repentance is More Than...

Calls to **"repent"** are all over the Bible (Ezek 18:30; Matt 3:2; Mark 1:15; Acts 2:38; 8:22; 17:30). Clearly, it matters to God. Clearly, it involves *us*, as his creation. Clearly, it is a choice God is calling us to make—



he's not going to force us against our will. So what is "repentance"?

A good Bible passage that can help us begin to understand what repentance really involves is 2 Corinthians 7. What came before 2 Corinthians? The letter we call 1 Corinthians. Paul's first letter to the church in Corinth was full of rebukes, corrections, and warnings. The church in Corinth was a troubled church in many ways. But notice what Paul writes to these same saints in 2 Corinthians 7:8-11:



For even if I made you	with my le	_ with my letter, I do not regret it–though I did				
regret it, for I see that that letter grieved you, though only for a while. As it is, I rejoice,						
not because you were grieved, but because you were grieved into						
For you felt a grief, so that you suffered no loss through us.						
For godly grief	a	that leads to salvation				
without regret, whereas	grief p	grief produces death. For see what				
earnestness this godly grief has produced in you, but also what eagerness to clear						
yourselves, what indignation, what fear, what longing, what zeal, what punishment! At						
every point you have proved yourselves in the matter.						

What is repentance? We are "grieved into" repenting, but the Holy Spirit wants us to understand that there's a big difference between "worldly" grief and "godly" grief. Worldly grief "produces death." That's not what God is looking for. Godly grief "produces a repentance that leads to salvation without regret." That's what we want to learn more about. That's what Peter preached in Acts 3:19-20, "Repent therefore, and \_\_\_\_\_\_\_ back, that your sins may be blotted out, that times of refreshing may come from the presence of the Lord." Sins can be forgiven. We can be innocent in the sight of God. But not without repentance.
