- Joseph was forced to be a slave. Jesus chose to be a servant
- Joseph and Jesus were tempted with sexual seduction (1 Cor. 10:13)
- Joseph paid an unfair price and suffered for someone else's sin just like Jesus
- Foretold their future exalted position as rulers
- Joseph would save the world of his day; Savior of the world would come through his family
- Innocent man came to our prison, sympathized with us (butler and baker) and was proved to be true after 3 days.

- The hero, of course we all want to be Joseph. Good looking, hard working, honest, godly, upright, trustworthy, caring and forgiving man
  - Are we like Joseph or more like some of the other characters we are introduced to?

**Conclusion:** From the <u>pit</u> to the <u>prison</u> to the <u>palace</u> Joseph submitted to the <u>plan</u> of God and depended on the <u>promises</u> given to his great-grand father Abraham.
