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A contrast in stumbling
·: an example of warning
- Four or five years earlier, he was described by Paul as "a fellow" (Col 4:12-14; Philem 23-24).
But somewhere along the way, he stumbled. Why? Demas had fallen "in world" (2 Tim 4:10).
: an example of hope and grace
 About 20 years earlier, he had disappointed Paul (Acts 12:12, 25; 13:1-5, 13; 15:35-40).
- Mark had stumbled, but now? "He is very to me for ministry (2 Tim 4:11).
Three very human situations
Paul had a strong: Alexander (4:14-15), but he kept entrusting himself to him who judges justly (1 Pet 2:21-23).
Paul had some who weren't as strong as they could have been (4:16), but he was graceful in the face of human weakness (1 Pet 2:24-25).
Paul had a stronger than any hurdle or obstacle he could possibly encounter (4:17-18), and he knew that he was never really alone (4:1)
