

As we enter the final quarter of the year, our theme, "Finish what was started," takes us to a

study of how the Old Testament finished.

The Bible story, starting with God's choosing of Abraham and His promise to build a large nation is shown through the conquest of the promise land through the hands of Joshua. As that nation was governed through the judges, the people



faltered. Ruled by kings, the nation splinters and divides.

The promise that God made to Abraham remains, that through Abraham all the nations of the earth will be blessed. Unfaithful, idolatrous, and wicked as the nation became, God kept His promise. Prophets were sent to teach and warn, but the people refused to listen. Finally, late in the Old Testament story, God sent His people to Babylon for a generation. God wasn't finished with them.

This series of lessons, takes place after the Babylonian captivity. There remained some things to finish.


