## **The Expectations of Worship**

It's another Wednesday night. It's been a long day. Yet, we have gathered here at the church building for another midweek worship service. We know that we ought to have the feelings of the Psalmist who joyfully proclaimed, "I was glad when they said to me, 'Let us go to the house of the Lord'" (Ps 122:1). And, though we'd never want to admit it, sometimes our soul says, as in Malachi, "My how tiresome it



is" (Mal 1:13). Or, as Peterson states it, "I'm bored this doesn't do anything for me."

What are some common misconceptions about worship?

## 1. Worship \_\_\_\_\_\_ with God

Our English word "worship" comes from the Latin, "\_\_\_\_\_\_" Worship is the expressing of honor, esteem, appreciation and recognizing the importance or value of something. You praise the "worth" Biblically, worship is about honoring God. We are saying, "How much is God \_\_\_\_\_\_ to you?"

## 2. Worship is \_\_\_\_\_ by God

God never says, "Surprise Me," "Do something different," or, "Be original."
