

On the day of Jesus' resurrection from the dead...

That very day two of them were going to a village named <u>Emmaus</u>, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and they were talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing together, <u>Jesus</u> himself drew near and went with them. But their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And he said to them, "What is this conversation that you are holding with each other as you walk?" And they stood still, looking sad. Then one of them,



named Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?" And he said to them, "What things?" And they said to him, "Concerning Jesus of Nazareth, a man who was a <u>prophet</u> mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and rulers delivered him up to be condemned to death, and crucified him. But we had <u>hoped</u> that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things happened. Moreover, some women of our company amazed us. They were at the tomb early in the morning, and when they did not find his body, they came back saying that they had even seen a vision of angels, who said that he was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but him they did not see." And he said to them, "O foolish ones, and <u>slow</u> of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself.

So they drew near to the village to which they were going. He acted as if he were going farther, but they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, for it is toward evening and the day is now far spent." So he went in to stay with them. When he was at table with them, he took the bread and blessed and broke it and gave it to them. And their eyes were opened, and they recognized him. And he <u>vanished</u> from their sight. They said to each other, "Did not our hearts burn within us while he talked to us on the road, while he <u>opened</u> to us the Scriptures?" And they rose that same hour and returned to Jerusalem. And they found the eleven and those who were with them gathered together, saying, "The Lord has risen indeed, and has appeared to Simon!" Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he was known to them in the breaking of the bread.

So what can we learn from the interaction of these two men with Jesus? Let's dig in...

## For Class & Family Discussion:

1.	These two "were talking with each other about all these things that had happened" in
	Jerusalem as they were making their way to Emmaus (24:14). What sort of things do
	you think they could have been talking about?

- 2. "While they were talking and discussing together, Jesus himself drew near and went with them" (24:15). What does Luke want to make sure we understand?
- 3. What do you think Cleopas meant by his statement in 24:21?
- 4. Why do you think Jesus said what he did in 24:25-26?
- 5. We're not told specifically what Jesus used as proof, but what sort of good possibilities can you think of "beginning with Moses and all the Prophets" that Jesus might have used to help these two understand from the Scriptures who he really was and what he had accomplished?

6. So what about us? We want not only to "cross paths" with Jesus, but to walk with him as his disciples. So what should we carry away with us from this interaction of these two men on the road with Jesus?
