




The LORD, the God of their fathers, sent persistently to them by his



So	lomon died, his son began to reign in his place. 1 Kings 12 tells
	that the people of Israel made a request of their new king:
	"Your father made our yoke Now therefore lighten the hard service of your father and his heavy yoke on us, and we will serve you." He said to them, "Go away for days, then come again to me." So the people went away. (12:4-5)
	ng Rehoboam began looking for advice, and he started with "the old men, who had before Solomon his father." Their counsel?
	"If you will be a to this people today and serve them, and speak good words to them when you answer them, then they will be your servants forever." (12:7)
	t Rehoboam also got input from "the young men who had grown up with him," and their vice was very different.
	"Thus shall you speak to this people who said to you, 'Your father made our yoke heavy, but you lighten it for us,' thus shall you say to them, 'My little is thicker than my father's thighs. And now, whereas my father laid on you a heavy yoke, I will to your yoke. My father disciplined you with whips, but I will discipline you with scorpions." (12:10-11)
